

# The Plan for a New El Cerrito Library

**MAGINE BRINGING** your coffee into a new library at the corner of Fairmount Avenue and Liberty Street to take your mind on a journey to distant lands, historic times, or imaginary worlds. Modern libraries are active places to gather and learn, to explore, to collaborate, to rest and relax, and to access new ideas.

El Cerrito is planning for a new library in its downtown core at BART's El Cerrito Plaza Station. Just steps from the Plaza shopping district, a new library would be safe and modern for residents to use for years to come. It would be big enough to have areas dedicated to different user experiences, including family reading areas, teen study areas, quiet reading areas for adults and seniors, meeting and tutoring

#### **ELECTION RESULTS AND BOARD CHANGES**

A Nominating Committee comprised of Aissia Ashoori, Kevin O'Neal, and Robert Rogers delivered its report at the general membership meeting on November 8th by Zoom. The committee's slate consisted of Evelyn Freitas (Guaranteed Rate) and Negar Souza (Red Oak Realty) along with incumbents Robert Rogers (Supervisor Gioia office) and Kevin O'Neal (Well Grounded Tea & Coffee Bar) for seats on the board of directors. Nick Arzio (JunkCat) was nominated from the floor. However, Arzio subsequently withdrew.

Therefore, with no contested seats, the four above members will be installed as directors on January 10, 2024, at a 9 a.m. Zoom meeting. To attend the meeting contact the Secretary for a Zoom link: **a.ashoori@elcerritochamber.org**.

In addition, Rachel Melby (Little Hill Real Estate) who was appointed as a director on March 1, 2023, to a vacant board seat, has decided to leave the Board of Directors with her final day being December 31, 2023. Early next year a replacement will be named.

spaces, and a safe place to provide as a cooling station for residents during extreme heat. This vision is the culmination of 25 years of hard work.

The existing library was built 75 years ago and shows its age. It has significant structural and safety issues including it does not meet seismic standards, it is not ADA compliant, and it does not have air conditioning or adequate heating. Built before the internet, it does not support the access needs of residents not enough computers, desks, or electrical outlets.

The City of El Cerrito still needs to partner with BART to build a new library at the BART Plaza Station Transit Oriented Development (TOD) Project on what is today a parking lot. The project is on track for the City's Design Review See Plan for a New El Cerrito Library, page 3

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is a federal civil rights law prohibiting discrimination against people with disabilities. That's all good and every business owner knows the rules.

But the ADA is also used by unscrupulous lawyers to extort money from businesses by having "clients" file numerous complaints, the sole intent being to get quick and substantial payoffs, rather than curing any alleged violation. ADA scams are a big business.

Commercial property owners can be a target as they have "deep pockets." Be proactive and ensure your properties are compliant. Post a sign stating "no public restroom" as that's a big gotcha.

## PLAN FOR A NEW EL CERRITO LIBRARY

Board to review the master plan in early 2024, which includes the con-

ceptual designs for our new 20,000-square-foot library at the corner of Fairmount and Liberty.


The vision for a new library can only be realized if El Cerrito raises \$21 million for the construction and ongoing maintenance. In 2023, the City began to explore options to fund the library. The City has held meetings and workshops to discuss the need, the vision, cost, and possible ways to fund the new library. Earlier this year they polled voters to determine if the funding initiative would pass in a possible March 5, 2024 ballot measure.

On Tuesday November 21st, after hearing the polling results, the City Council voted to continue to explore funding options, including a possible funding initiative in 2025. The poll, conducted October 9 to October 17, reflects the anxiety residents feel with inflation, high gas prices and global

wars. El Cerrito is not unique in this

regard-this anxiety is experienced by

other municipalities across the state. The recent polling did indicate majority support for a library funding measure,

although support did not exceed 60%, below the needed two-thirds support to pass.

In their decision to postpone, the Council highlighted their optimism that a possible funding initiative would succeed in the future, citing growing trust in the City's management of public funds and the opportunity of additional time for community outreach. The Council directed staff to continue participating in the planning for a library at the Plaza


station, including public outreach, preliminary design and detailed cost estimates. The exact language of a future library funding initiative will be determined at a later time. As described by the City Attorney, such a measure could allow adjustments over time for both one-time costs of construction and on-going costs for maintenance and similar expenses.

To build the library El Cerrito needs, wants, and deserves, we will likely need to pass a funding initiative. A library at the BART Plaza Station, which saves more than \$10 million over a stand-alone library, is our

best chance to have that cup of coffee at a new library in 2028.

# New Book Highlights Chris Strachwitz and His Down Home Music

The event celebrated the publication of "Down Home Music: The Stories and Photographs of Chris Strachwitz." The 240-page book was authored by local music critic Joel Selvin, best known for his column that ran in the San Francisco Chronicle until 2009.



The book, which has drawn rave reviews, is a visual storytelling celebration of American roots music in its rich variety. The book features never-

before-published photographs by the founder of the legendary Arhoolie Records, Chris Strachwitz.


Strachwitz passed away in May at the age of 91. He was the founder of El Cerrito-based Arhoolie Records and had a deep passion for documenting eclectic American music through writings and photographs.

The event was hosted by renowned author and music journalist Joel Selvin, who worked with Strachwitz to document the stories behind the pictures. Selvin also contributed his own interpretive writings about Arhoolie Records and its cultural legacy.

Strachwitz's talent and interest in photography allowed him to document musical history for decades. His voice and recollections are captured by Selvin in the notes that accompany each invaluable image.

Chris Strachwitz documented history while running a very successful business. Founded

in 1960, his Arhoolie Records went on to produce more than 400 albums in genres like gospel, blues, Cajun, zydeco, hillbilly, and more.

Strachwitz often toted his camera and audio recording equipment, capturing the sights and sounds of legendary artists including Lightnin' Hopkins and Mississippi Fred McDowell.

Nestled between the soft, toasted torta rolls, the burger was gen-

The program is intended to support local artists who work with recycled materials, and to encourage environmental stewardship—specifically, *resource conservation*, *recycling*, *and upcycling*—in the community through art that inspires people to think about sustainability and consumption.

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
